<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Play some Maths games on a tablet or computer.</li> <li>b. Practise your number formation. Can you write out all the numbers from 0-100?!</li> <li>c. Practise adding and subtracting 2 numbers. Make your own 0-9 number cards and then use them to make numbers. E.g. turn your 0-9 cards face down then choose 3 cards and turn them over. The cards I choose were 1, 7 and 4. So, I could do <math>14 - 7 =</math> or <math>71 + 4 =</math> or <math>47 + 1 =</math> or <math>74 - 1 =</math> etc.</li> <li>d. Make a weekly planner. Write the month, year, days and date on it. Also include the activities you plan to do while at home!</li> <li>e. Fill up a jug with different amounts of water. Can you fill it up to 100ml? 200ml? 500ml? etc. So that water is not wasted, can you do it in the bath or use the water you have measured to water plants?</li> <li>f. Draw a dragon using mostly straight lines and a ruler! Try to draw lots of different shapes to create your dragon. You could also make a model of a dragon using recycling!</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Find out when animated fairy tale films were made e.g. Sleeping Beauty, Snow White, The Little Mermaid, Tangled. How are the older and newer films different and similar?</li> <li>b. Use Microsoft Word or a similar programme to type a character description of your favourite hero or villain from a fairy tale.</li> <li>c. Create a PowerPoint presentation to show the 2, 5 or 10 x tables.</li> <li>d. Complete tasks on Purple Mash and practise maths on Mathletics.</li> <li>e. The Black Forest is a forest which, according to legend inspired lots of original fairy tales. Find out where the Black Forest is using Google maps. Have a look at some pictures of it and the castles that are there. What do you think about them? You could create a fact-file or poster to show pictures and what information you have found.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Practise your letter formation for lower case letters by writing out as many words that you can think of that have four or less letters. E.g. cat, ball, red, is.</li> <li>b. Write out the ingredients for a magical wizard or witches' potion. Write instructions on how to make it!</li> <li>c. Read a story out loud every day. Can you read to someone you live with or film yourself reading a story and send it to someone?</li> <li>d. Write your own version of a fairy tale with changes! Maybe you make Rapunzel rescue a prince from a tower or the three little pigs could become three little warthogs and the wolf a lion?</li> <li>e. Practise your phonics sounds using your RWInc books or flashcards. Can you practise for 10 minutes daily?</li> <li>f. Every day, choose a RWInc phoneme or grapheme. Write as words that have that sound in them! Put the words you think of into sentences or a short story.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Castles are a popular setting in fairy tales. Find out about castle defences, such as the moat, and write about how you would protect your own castle.</li> <li>b. Using fruit, create a house like the sweetie house from Hansel &amp; Gretel.</li> <li>c. Create scaly dragons using salt paint. Using water colours, paint a picture of a dragon and before the paint dries, sprinkle salt over it. Some amazing patterns should emerge! You could write about what happens when the paint has dried.</li> <li>d. Role-play or act out a fairy tale. It could from memory, from a story book you have or even from a film you have seen. Can you use costumes and props?</li> </ul>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Home Learning Choice Grid</b></p> <p>Here are some new activities that could be completed.
